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## White Paper on Immigration Reform

The Government has committed to reducing the levels of net migration to the UK, and inevitably this involves changes to the Immigration Rules. 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#### Changes to the Skilled Worker salary rules

On 9 April, the Home Office changed the rules on how "salary" is calculated for immigration purposes. This article is essential reading for any business that helps cover the cost of visa applications and health surcharges by providing loans, or who ask the applicant to meet the cost by making a payment to the company to cover these.

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# Sponsor compliance checks

# Skilled Worker interviews

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Alongside the increase in compliance interviews, we have also seen an increase in the number of visa applicants being required to attend interviews with the Home Office before their visa can be granted.
